

I AM A HIGH-SCHOOL STUDENT, FUTURE UNIVERSITY STUDENT

What transportation means are available to and from the campus?

Some buses are accessible (line n°4). The metro is completely accessible. For private transportation, contact Handistar. (You can find all their contact information in the Disability Services section, subsection "useful information and addresses").

Is the Villejean campus accessible for people with reduced physical mobility?

The Villejean campus is in fact accessible. The Disability Services offer guided visits so you can figure out the best ways to get around campus.

I have a disability or an health issue, am I entitled to housing?

Some situations can require adapted housing and/or housing in close proximity to the campus. You can request suitable housing from the CROUS (from the dedicated service), which will consider the requests according to disabilities and availability, so make sure you make your request ahead of time.

STUDYING

I have a disability or an health issue, to what accommodations am I entitled?

Each case will be considered individually and confidentially. Here are some (but not all) of the accommodations that can be put in place to help you:

During your studies:

Help with note-taking

Equipment loans

Course-load adaptations

Parking space

Etc

For exams:

Extra time during the tests

Help from a secretary

Equipment loans (computers, accessibility tools ...)

Taking your exam in an isolated room

Help from a (french) sign language or cued speech specialist

Transcription of the exam questions in Braille

Adaptations in the wording of the exam questions

Physical accessibility

Each student has a right to these accommodations after making an appointment with one of the University Health Center's doctors and explaining their situation. This step will have to be repeated every year (unless there are extraordinary circumstances).

When should I contact the Disability Services?

Ideally, contact the Disability Services at the end of the school year before you go to university (at the end of June.) But you can also contact us as early as the first of September so we can start putting your accommodations into place. You can also find us each year at the university fair.

I'm Deaf or HoH, is this University accessible for me?

Of course, Rennes 2 University is required to make learning accessible to everyone and offers the help of (French) Sign Language / Cued speech specialists at every step of your studies.

I'm blind or visually impaired, is this University accessible for me?

The Disability Services can transcribe your course material in Braille if necessary. Make sure you request this accommodation in advance.

I have a language or speech disorder, is this recognized by the University?

Language or speech disorders (such as dyslexia, etc...) are recognized in some cases as a disability by the University. In order to get it recognized as a disability, have a recent report from a Speech Therapist and bring it to an appointment with the University Health Center's doctors.

If I am registered at the Disability Services, to whom is this information made available?

Only the University's doctors, the Disability Services members and the professors are aware of this, as well as any person you disclose it to.

Am I entitled to the help of a Classroom Aide at University?

Classroom Aides do not exist at the University level. Daily life tasks are your responsibility (with help from the MDPH - "Departmental House of Disabled People"). Rennes 2 University makes sure you have access to learning through note-taking helpers (these students are in the same classes as you, and are in charge of sharing their class notes with you.)

I AM A STUDENT AT RENNES 2 UNIVERSITY

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I have a temporary disability (illness, injury, etc ...), am I entitled to help?

Yes, the Disability Services can help with any disability or health issue, even if it is temporary, as long as it is formally approved by the University Health Center's doctors.

Where can I find the sick bay?

Rennes 2 University's sick bay is located on the second floor of the EREVE building, at the center of Villejean campus, inside the University Health Center. There, you can meet with nurses, doctors and psychologists.

I've been hospitalized, can I still continue my studies?

Provided you have proof, the Disability Services can recruit a note-taker to send you the class notes for as long as you're unable to go to class.

I am dyslexic, is this disability recognized by the University?

Dyslexia is in fact recognized by the University, in some cases, as a disability. In order to get it recognized as a disability, have a recent report from a Speech Therapist and bring it to an appointment with the University Health Center's doctors.

I have a disability or an health issue, but it is not recognized by the MDPH. Am I still entitled to help?

A doctor will study each accommodation request and grant the appropriate accommodations. (A first analysis of your needs can be made by the Disability Services members.)
